Reasons for Refusal

- 1 The proposed development, due to the proximity to the shared boundary, would close the important gap between the existing properties to the detriment of the character and appearance of the street scene, contrary to policy DBE10 of the adopted Local Plan and Alterations, policy DM 9 of the Submission Version Local Plan (2017), and the guidance contained within the National Planning Policy Framework.
- 2 The proposed development, due to the bulk and proximity to the shared boundary, would have an overbearing impact on the neighbouring residents at number 3 Ely Place resulting in a loss of amenity, contrary to policy DBE9 of the adopted Local Plan and Alterations, policy DM 9 of the Submission Version Local Plan (2017), and the guidance contained within the National Planning Policy Framework.

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Informatives:

The Local Planning Authority has acted positively and proactively in determining this application by identifying matters of concern with the proposal and clearly setting these out in the reason(s) for refusal. Furthermore, Members of the planning committee which took the decision to refuse planning permission have been asked to consider whether there are opportunities to amend the development to address this harm. Where a potential way forward has been identified, this has been communicated to the Applicant. The Local Planning Authority is willing to provide pre-application advice in respect of any future application for a revised development.

NOTES RELATING TO PLANNING APPLICATIONS TOWN AND COUNTRY PLANNING ACT 1990

1. If the applicant is aggrieved by the decision of the Local Planning Authority to refuse permission or approval for the proposed development, he may appeal to the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government, in accordance with Section 78 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990. If an Enforcement Notice is served relating to the same or substantially the same land and development as in your application and if you want to appeal against the Local Planning Authority's decision on your application, then you must do so within 28 days of the date of the Enforcement Notice or within 12 weeks of the date of this notice, whichever period expires earlier. In all other cases, if you want to appeal then you must do so within 12 weeks of receipt of this notice. (Appeals must be made on a form which is obtainable from the Planning Inspectorate, Customer Support Unit, Temple Quay House, 2 The Square, Temple Quay, Bristol, BS1 6PN. Tel: 0303 444 5000, or online at the following website: www.planningportal.gov.uk/pcs) The Secretary of State has power to allow a longer period for the giving of a notice of appeal but he will not normally be prepared to exercise this power unless there are special circumstances which excuse the delay in giving notice of appeal. The Secretary of State is not required to entertain an appeal if it appears to him that permission for the proposed development could not have been granted by the Local Planning Authority or could not have been so granted otherwise than subject to the conditions imposed by them, having regard to the statutory requirements, to the provisions of any development order, and to any directions given under the order. He does not in practice refuse to entertain appeals solely because the decision of the Local Planning Authority was based on a direction given by him. There is no time limit for appealing against a decision relating to a Certificate of Lawful Use or Development.
2. If permission to develop land is refused, or granted subject to conditions, whether by the Local Planning Authority or by the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government and the owner of the land claims that the land has become incapable of reasonably beneficial use in its existing state and cannot be rendered capable of reasonably beneficial use by the carrying out of any development which has been or would be permitted, he may serve on the Council of the County District in which the land is situated a purchase notice requiring that Council to purchase his interest in the land in accordance with the provisions of Part VI of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990.
3. In certain circumstances, a claim may be made against the Local Planning Authority for compensation, where permission is refused or granted subject to conditions by the Secretary of State on appeal or on a reference of an application to him. The circumstances in which such compensation is payable are set out in Section 114 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990.
